




ESPR = framework legislation


i.e. does not set specific measures. Rather, it enables their later adoption





ESPR requirements development process









2. Novel Sustainability & Ecodesign approach



Broad Scope

Moving beyond energy-related products to a wide product scope



New sustainability & ecodesign aspects

e.g. Durability, CO₂ footprint, Recycled content, etc.



Horizontal measures

Common ecodesign requirements for products with similarities




Strong focus on product information

Digital Product Passport & Labels



How will ESPR work?

3. By adding new tools



Mandatory **Green Public Procurement**

ESPR will enable mandatory GPP criteria to be set for contracting authorities or contracting entities



Prevention of destruction of unsold consumer goods

Transparency requirements for those discarding unsold goods, and possibility to ban their destruction for relevant product groups.

Ban on destruction of **apparel** and **footwear** after 2 years



Market surveillance and customs controls

Strong focus on controls of regulated products, including planned market surveillance activities, support to common projects and investments.



Ecodesign Forum









AIM?

Involvement of stakeholders in ESPR implementation

HOW?

Consultation on ESPR priorities, ecodesign requirements, market surveillance, self-regulation measures, etc.

WHO?

MS & public authorities, organisations, individuals representing a common interest

WHEN?

Continuously open call for applications

Selection criteria

- ✓ Competence and experience in the tasks of the Forum
- ✓ Capacity to effectively represent a position shared by stakeholders
- ✓ Interest and/or technical expertise in aspects relevant to product sustainability, ecodesign, energy labelling, and/or the digital product passport
- ✓ Good knowledge of English



Membership status

Full members

- Active participation in discussions
- Active participation in decisionmaking (consensus or voting) & formulation of recommendations

Observers

- May be permitted by the Chair to take part in the discussions
- Cannot participate in decisionmaking & formulation of reccomendations

Same application process and criteria COM will appoint members & observers based on needs




Key aspects in scope of ESPR



Requirements

Product specific or horizontal



Digital Product Passport (DPP)

Labels

Performance (classes of performance)

Substances of Concern (SoC)

Customers and other actors

Treatment facilities

Horizontal requirements

When two or more product groups display similarities allowing a product aspect to be effectively improved based on common information or performance requirements

Performance requirements

Based on product parameters (Annex I)

Qualitative

Quantitative





Digital Product Passport (DPP)

- Will provide a single, digital entry point to access to product information throughout the product life cycle, on a need-to-know basis
- It will contain, as relevant to the product:
 - For **consumers**: data on environmental impacts, circularity, carbon footprint, etc.
 - For value retention: information to facilitate for reuse, remanufacturing or recycling (e.g. presence of substances of concern)
 - For authorities: compliance information (e.g. technical documentation)





Green Public Procurement (GPP)

- GPP minimum **mandatory** requirements for products covered under ESPR delegated acts may be set via implementing acts
- IAs set minimum requirements in the form of technical specifications, award criteria, contract performance or targets
- Minimum requirements shall be based on two highest performance classes, scores, or best performance level
- Possibility of 15-30% weighting of such award criteria in the tender assessment
- GPP targets procurement of most environmentally sustainable products - minimum percentage of 50% at contracting authority or aggregated national level

Self-regulation measures

Min. 2 economic operators

Market share ≥ 80%

+ open to others

Objective achieved more quickly & to a lesser expense

Publicised on freely accessible website

Independent inspector
Compliance report every year

For products not included in a delegated act or in the working plan
